Business Services

Business Services is responsible for Facilities Planning, Fiscal Services (including Payroll/Benefits and Accounting), Internal Audit, Risk Management, Procurement, and Central Warehouse. A major accomplishment for the Procurement Department was the negotiation of the Ellucian Agreement for both our district and all California community colleges. The district partnered with the State Chancellor's Office and the Foundation for California Community Colleges to restructure the purchasing process and make public contracting code compliant. The new agreement established beneficial terms for purchasing Ellucian products and services, including Banner, an enterprise resource planning (ERP) system.

Human Resources

Human Resources provides services and support in hiring, employee relations, compensation, and staff development which enables our employees to contribute to student success. Key achievements during 2021-22 included:

- Implemented the new EXCEL (Excellence in Communication and Educational Leadership) Academy a one semester academy with classified, faculty, and management team members that is designed to prepare future college and district leaders.
- Created, negotiated, and implemented the voluntary hybrid/remote work program for eligible classified employees. This experimental program will be evaluated to potentially turn it into a more permanent program.
- Managed the challenges of the pandemic while in compliance with local, state, and federal agencies.
- Streamlined Workday processes to be more efficient in recruitment, hiring, changing jobs, and termination.
- Simplified the evaluation process which dramatically reduced the percentage of overdue evaluations.
- Initiated new 360 evaluations for administrators under contract.

Educational & Technology Services

Educational & Technology Services leads and/or assists with the coordination and review of educational programs and technology services offered in the district. In 2022, the department worked in collaboration with the California Virtual Campus and started the district's process to transition to the Banner ERP system. Ongoing departmental efforts include:

- Fostering collaboration between the colleges and District Services on allocation of technology resources.
- Coordinating district and college research functions with a focus on student success.
- Providing leadership and coordination in enrollment management and distance education programs.
- Facilitating programs between the district and colleges, universities, high schools, and regional occupational programs.
- Coordinating workforce preparation programs in cooperation with regional businesses / industry.
- Chairing committees and task forces that address issues, such as the academic calendar, student information system, district planning, and remote education.

Irvine Valley College

rvine Valley College offers a small-college environment with more than 60 acres of modern facilities and equipment. Its dedicated staff and faculty combine knowledge and experience with a sincere commitment to learning. After its creation as a satellite campus in 1979, IVC became an independent institution in 1985, and has seen its transfer rates and campus community flourish.

Its faculty includes authors, Fulbright scholars, scientists, professional musicians, and entrepreneurs who are accessible and student-focused. IVC offers two-year associate degrees in over 80 majors in the liberal arts and sciences, business, and technologies. Students can complete general education and pre-major requirements for transfer to four-year colleges or train for a specific job by earning a certificate in one of 70 career and technical programs.

Advanced Technology & Education Park (ATEP)

TEP in Tustin is being developed as a partnership between the district and private companies that focuses on career technical and workforce development training. During 2022, two parcels entered into lease agreements and the construction of the Saddleback@ATEP project were approved. The Saddleback College buildings will house the culinary arts, logistics, and advanced automotive programs. The culinary space will have three commercial-quality kitchens, a public restaurant, and a coffee/bakery bar. The automotive program will use four instructional classrooms and 20,000 square feet of state-of-the-art lab space.

College Corps: Helping the Community


IVC is one of the first community colleges to host a state-wide program called College Corps, which places students in community organizations that are working on education, climate action, or food insecurity. Student volunteers who complete 450 hours of service will receive \$10,000 in aid, academic credit determined by the college, job training and real-world skills. In August 2022, the Board of Trustees approved Dr. Julianna M. Barnes to serve as the district's 10th chancellor. Embracing Diversity, Equity,

Inclusion, & Accessibility

e understand that diversity makes us stronger.
We value faculty, staff, and students who embody different cultures, ages, religions, gender identities, sexual orientations, abilities, and life experiences. It is our belief that this breadth of human experience provides the foundation for rich educational experiences, as well as vibrant campus communities. The district has instituted several programs to help reach these goals, including the First Name Campaign, Caring Campus, Pride Scholars, Affinity Groups, and more. Another solution is to eliminate as much unconscious bias as possible from our interactions. To that end, more than 2,500 district employees are required to take annual training on unconscious bias.

BLOOM Internship Program

Human Resources created the Building Leadership Opportunities through Outstanding Mentorship (B.L.O.O.M.) program. BLOOM is part of the district's EEO efforts to recruit, hire, and retain a diverse faculty that reflect the experiences of our students. The program matches up prospective faculty hires with existing faculty mentors. The participants are trained by the mentors in student support and modern teaching methods, as well as insights into the profession. BLOOM's goal is to enhance student success and equitable outcomes by attracting a diverse future faculty.

Inclusion often means making those who have been left out feel welcome such as the roughly 15% of our students who are the first in their family to attend college. Both colleges hold an annual First Gen College Student celebration, with booths, treats, and information about campus resources giving First Gen students an opportunity to connect with their peers.












Total District Budget



District Operating Expenditures, 2021-22






Employee Category
